Twitter

What is Twitter?

- Twitter is an information network for all clubs, Local Authorities and members.
- Twitter is a service for friends, family, and co-workers to communicate and stay connected through the exchange of quick, frequent messages
- Twitter is about interaction between members and Hockey Wales.

How do I access Twitter?

By logging onto www.twitter.com from a pc, laptop, phone or any other device that connects to the internet. You will need to create a username and password. Your username should be similar to your actual name, this allows people to search for your profile easily. Eg. @JohnDavies1 or @KellyDavies44.

So what is a 'Tweet'?

- At the heart of Twitter are small bursts of information called Tweets.
- Tweets can be about anything you want, but should be informative for other people.
- They must be 140 characters or less.
- Can include a link to a webpage for further information
- Can include a photo/image
- Use of a Hash tag (#) links your tweet to similar trends

Who are my followers?

- People who follow you and your timeline are your followers
- You can follow people but they don't have to follow you back (and vice versa)
- Tweets from those you are following appear in your timeline
- Your tweets appear in the timeline of those following you

Composing a Tweet

What is a 'Retweet' & a 'Reply'?

- If someone likes your tweet they may "retweet" it to their followers.
- If you like someone's tweet or agree with what they say (or not) and want to share it with your followers, you can "retweet" theirs
- To retweet simply click on the RETWEET button
- It will appear exactly the same, with a comment acknowledging that you have retweeted someone else's tweet.
- You can 'reply' to a tweet which will form a public conversation about someone's tweet.
- If you do not want a public conversation, you can Direct Message (DM) someone by pressing the message icon on their profile.

What do I write in the biography section of my profile?

- Anything that describes who you are and what your interests are.
- If you are using your account for work purposes, you should state that views are your own.
- Your tweets should remain professional and avoid controversial topics.
- Ensure your profile is engaging and represents you and your company.

A few do's and don'ts...

- Don't get too personal & involved in discussions that could reflect badly on the organisation
- Be aware that anything you retweet will appear to all your followers.
- Always be conscious of your audience, you cannot control who follows you, including young players.
- Any issues or concerns should not be dealt with publicly, ensure you approach problems professionally.
