What an incredible year it's been! We extend our heartfelt gratitude to all the clubs, volunteers, players, coaches, umpires, officials, and committee members who work tirelessly to make hockey possible year-round. Despite the challenges, your dedication has been nothing short of amazing, and we deeply appreciate your hard work and commitment to our beloved sport.

At the grassroots level, it's encouraging to see the number of adult hockey teams holding steady compared to last year. Hockey has demonstrated remarkable resilience in the post-Covid era, faring well against other team sports. Junior hockey remains robust, with clubs reporting healthy participation across all levels. We're also thrilled to see gender equality thriving in our sport, even amid concerns about the

rising popularity of girls' and women's football and cricket. Our stance remains firm and inclusive: as long as hockey continues to offer fantastic experiences nationwide, opportunities for growth and success will only increase.

This year, we witnessed tremendous excitement and support for the Welsh national teams, especially during the Easter period in 24. Back last August the women's team earned a bronze medal at the Euro Hockey Championship Il in Prague, and the men's team achieved a stunning draw against Germany in the opening round of the Euro Hockey tournament, despite being the only fully amateur team in the competition. The collaboration between staff teams and players is inspiring, and we eagerly anticipate their future achievements.

Continuing the international theme, it has been a tremendous year for athletes representing Great Britain.
Currently there are 10 athletes within the GB set up. 5 at senior level and 5 at Elite Development (EDP). It's fantastic to see Wales punching well above its weight and a huge congratulations to all involved. Hopefully we will have more good news to celebrate when the Olympic squads are announced in June.

At the club level, the indoor league saw outstanding efforts from Darren Morgan-Lock and volunteers, setting the stage for an even bigger and better competition next season.

Cardiff & Met Men continue to excel, maintaining their premier league status, a significant achievement for the club and men's hockey.



Moreover, our team has expanded with the recruitment of three Hockey Development Officers, strategically placed in West Wales, East Wales, and North Wales. Their mission: to amplify our presence in schools and clubs, igniting a passion for hockey in every corner of their respective regions and getting 'more sticks in hands'.

Under the guidance of our People Development & Competitions Events Manager, we've witnessed the fruition of over 25 competitions and events across the nation, engaging both schools and clubs alike. This concerted effort has not only enriched the hockey experience but has also fostered a sense of camaraderie and healthy competition within our community.

Furthermore, our Project Manager has spearheaded a successful Heritage Project, honouring the legacy of those who have proudly represented Wales internationally. From the 80s to the present, this initiative has enabled players to receive their well-deserved caps, preserving our rich hockey history for generations to come. Additionally, their efforts in revitalising the Young Ambassador programme have garnered admiration from European nations, setting a benchmark for youth development initiatives in the sport.

Athlete Records

Historically, records were never maintained to track those athletes who represented Wales and the outcomes of the games. Our amazing volunteers Phil Bailey and Steve Knight are in their 7th year of researching these records and we are extremely excited about their progress this last year. We now believe we are in a position where we only have gaps between 2002-2007 for the men, however, we still have a longer journey to go with the women. These gaps are being filled by our incredible Alumni who are collating their records and evidence and working with our historians to confirm their

records, thank you for your support so far and we cannot wait to complete these records so we can showcase this with the World.

Caps Celebration Events

As we confirm player records and whether they played in a capped game, we can now start presenting Alumni with their first international cap for representing Wales. We welcomed 50 alumni to Sophia Gardens in August, where they finally received their first cap surrounded by friends, family, and teammates, sharing stories of their time playing for Wales and catching up with long-lost friends. CLUB ANALYSIS

Our club membership has remained strong and consistent with previous years, from our junior participants to our over-18s in both male and female games. We are particularly thrilled to report successful

growth in our Hockey Family membership, especially among women. Additionally, we have seen an impressive increase in the number of coaches within our clubs. It's exciting to see more players aged 18 and over taking on coaching and umpiring roles throughout the season, showcasing their commitment and passion for the sport.



FACILITIES

We have successfully contributed to site development through the **Sport Wales Collaboration** Fund, partnering with the RCT Council for the Hawthorn High School project. Our financial support of over £150,000 has been instrumental in moving this development forward, ensuring that the necessary infrastructure is in place to support the growth of sports in the region. This collaboration not only enhances the physical site but also instils a stronger relationship between the school and the local community, promoting greater engagement and participation in sports.

Additionally, we have provided £200,000 for the redevelopment of the artificial turf pitch at Ysgol Godre'r Berwyn in Bala in support of the school, Bala Hockey Club and other surrounding clubs. This significant investment will greatly enhance the hockey facilities in North Wales, offering improved training and playing conditions for athletes. The upgraded pitch is expected to attract more participants, boost local interest in hockey, and provide a top-tier venue for both school competitions

and community events. This redevelopment is a critical step in our mission to strengthen sports provision and ensure that young athletes have access to the best possible resources.

Furthermore, we consistently quide and direct clubs towards the Be Active Wales Fund and Crowdfunder Grant. These resources are vital in helping clubs improve their facility capabilities, allowing them to offer better training environments and attract more members. Additionally, these funds provide crucial support for upskilling through courses and acquiring more equipment for clubs and schools in need. By equipping coaches and volunteers with the necessary skills and resources, we aim to enhance the overall quality of Hockey programs across Wales.

Our commitment extends beyond immediate financial support. We are dedicated to maintaining a strong track record of successful applicants in next year's bids, ensuring that hockey facilities continue to become more accessible and of higher quality across Wales. By investing in these projects and supporting clubs

through available grants, we are working towards a future where sports infrastructure meets the growing demand and contributes to the health and well-being of communities throughout the country. Our efforts are not just about funding but about fostering a culture of active participation and excellence in sports.

SCHOOL ANALYSIS

During the school terms, we have witnessed a remarkable surge in hockey activities, thanks to the efforts of our newly appointed Hockey Development Officers in each region. Their dedication and strategic planning have significantly revitalised interest and participation in hockey across the country. Since their appointment, we have successfully hosted numerous hockey festivals throughout Wales. Notably, our recently rebranded festival was a tremendous success, attracting over 100 enthusiastic participants from five different primary schools. This event not only showcased the growing of the sport but also provided a platform for young talents to demonstrate their skills and passion for hockey.

In addition to organising festivals, we have established strong partnerships with local authorities and schools in regions such as Gwent, Neath, and Port Talbot. These collaborations have enabled us to offer extended hockey opportunities for young people, thereby significantly

enhancing our outreach and impact. Through these joint efforts, we have been able to introduce more structured and frequent hockey sessions, ensuring that the sport is accessible to a wider audience and fostering a community of young hockey enthusiasts. We are looking forward to growing these partnerships as well as activating more within each local authority across Wales next season.

Furthermore, we have launched a pilot of our innovative initiative, 'Switch the Pitch.' This program is designed to empower primary and secondary schools to confidently deliver hockey on multiple surfaces in various locations. By providing the necessary resources and training, 'Switch the Pitch' encourages schools to incorporate hockey into their physical education curriculum and extracurricular activities, regardless of their existing facilities. This initiative not only diversifies the playing environments but also ensures that students have the opportunity to play hockey

in both traditional and nontraditional settings, thereby broadening their experience and adaptability of the sport.

Overall, the impact of our Hockey Development Officers has been profound, leading to increased participation, improved skills, and a stronger hockey community across Wales. The continued success of our festivals, partnerships, and initiatives like 'Switch the Pitch' highlights our commitment to promoting hockey and providing young people with valuable opportunities to engage in this dynamic and enjoyable sport.

ACHIEVING POTENTIAL HIGHLIGHTS

At the time of writing we are almost at the halfway point in our 4 year cycle and continue to try to make the required progress on our journey towards the Commonwealth Games and World Cup year of 2026. All our Performance teams play a key part in this process, with our Junior and Dreigiau International squads building a depth of numbers and experiences to support onward transition to the senior programmes and the senior programmes forming and reforming their plans and strategies and reviewing these against the competitive match opportunities that present themselves. It will not go unnoticed by even the most casual of observers that this process is undertaken against a current backdrop of funding reductions, considerable increases in required player contributions, less ability to resource a certain level of

Performance support to our squads and of course as an often-direct consequence of these challenges and more, a consistent turnover of players and staff into and out of our programmes. What I am most proud of though is the continuing approach in our Performance teams to see beyond the issues, use them positively as a way of strengthening our resolve and collective spirit and to leverage this towards demonstrating that wonderful characteristic in Welsh sport of fighting and challenging to achieve beyond our means and others' expectations when it really matters.

This last year was a great example of playing our full part in daring to believe that we can continue to achieve beyond our means on the continental and world stage. Our U18 teams pushed their opponents extremely hard in their home

Europeans in Swansea and showed their collective force in a number of their performances and whilst in some cases not always managing to secure the results they wanted or seize enough of the key moments, the players benefitted from the rich experiences they gained, with a number of them already transitioning into this year's Dreigiau or Senior squads.

The exploits of our Senior Men in Germany at the European Championships will live long in the memory and gave us lots to be proud of and whilst they will be disappointed to miss out on the top 6 and avoid having to re-qualify for the Championship division again, they remained highly competitive against a number of full time European Hockey nations. The epic 3-3 draw and legacy performance against recently crowned World Champions and hosts Germany in a packed and partisan full stadium again



proved our ability to compete with the very best at the top table and demonstrated that at our best we can be a match for most. The exposure earlier in the summer for a number of younger players to their first taste of senior International Hockey also ensures that succession planning is being carefully considered on an ongoing basis to cover any future departures to what has been a previously consistent and settled group of men. The team sadly bid farewell after their European campaign to popular manager Will Packer who will be sorely missed but they have a perfect replacement in the very experienced and equally likeable Gwyn Williams who recently and seamlessly picked up the baton.

The Senior Women were able to use the early summer of 2023 to transition a number of players from outside the squad into the main body of the senior group to replace those that moved on or retired. This saw 6 players get their 1st International caps during the great experience of a trip to Uruguay to play an invitational 3 nations against

them and Chile. This proved to be useful preparation as they managed to finish 3rd and claim a Bronze medal in European Championship II in Prague, something that has eluded the group at this level since 2009. The youthful nature of the squad is a pleasing nod to the good work carried out in our transitional programmes in recent years and therefore this level of engagement and opportunity is crucial to allow future senior cycles to at least maintain their position if not able to improve on it.

Whilst it was a non-U21 tournament year for our Dreigiau groups, they have been building capacity and experiences as they continue to develop and transition players into and through their respective programmes and undertaking the first year of a two-year cycle which culminates in the European U21 Championships in July 2024.

In the theme of continuing to overreach positively with our Hockey, on Olympic year I want to conclude by mentioning our group of Great Britain athletes, which are now 10 in number across the various programmes, which is the highest representation I can ever remember us having in Hoci Cymru and we wish all those involved currently in the Senior programme the very best wishes as they wait to hear soon about Olympic selection for Paris 2024 which of course will be a wonderful event to showcase our great sport once again to the watching World.

All eyes now on Performance are fixed towards those aforementioned Olympics, and our Senior teams battling it out in their respective European Qualifiers in August, with our U21 squads in European competition to try and qualify for promotion in their divisions as well as Junior World Cup qualification. We also have a Senior Women/Dreigiau team in the Euro 5's as well as both our U16 representative teams from our Junior squads. It promises to be a busy and exciting summer with many memories made and hopefully many key moments taken!

PATHWAY

County

The 2023/2024 season saw our rebranded Pathway run for its inaugural season. This pathway brought County Hockey back to the forefront and impressively for 23/24 we had 8 Counties across Wales with over 600 players, between 13-17 years old, nominated. Counties had an U15 girls, U17 girls and Boys sides represented.

This equated to 8 x U15 Girls (11 a side), 8 x U17 Girls teams (11 a side), 12 x Boys teams (7 a side). Counties trained regularly and competed in 3 Cluster matches against other counties whilst preparing for the County Championships which ran during the February half term.

U15 Girls had 16 matches over the county championships which equated to 560minutes of hockey

U17 Girls had 16 matches over the county championships which equated to 560minutes of hockey.

Boys – 34 matches over county championships which equated to 850minutes of hockey.

In total over the February half term nearly 2000 minutes of hockey was played, umpired and spectated. Well done to all players and teams who participated and congratulations to the county champions of 2023/24.

During the County season the county head coaches were also looking at players within their counties to nominate to the next level, as well as this during the County Festival, NAGS coaches were also present observing and selecting players for the next level, Regional.



Regional

Our Regional Academies recently started with the first session at the end of April. This has seen 4 Regional centres, North, South West, South East 1 and South East 2 provide further technical and holistic development for approximately 200 junior athletes and 17 coaches/managers. The Regional Academies follow training day expectations of NAGS level. These are 6-hour full days which have both on and off pitch development.

These centres utilise our Regional Partnerships with Wrexham University, Swansea University and Cardiff Met University as well as Sport Wales support.

Excitingly for 2023/24, we will also be bringing players from the 4 centres together to create a Regional Representative Wales side to compete in the 2024 School Games, a multisport competition hosted at Loughborough University.

A big thank you to all pathway players, parents and coaches who have help steer and shape this new pathway season. After the conclusion of the pathway season a review period will take place for the 2023/2024 season.



NATIONAL AGE GROUPS

2023 - Completion of the 2022/23 season

2023 was an exciting year for our U18 National Age Groups with Swansea hosting both the boys and girls EuroHockey Championship II competition. This was an incredible event hosted in partnership with Swansea University. The girls got a silver medal and competed against Turkey and Poland. Full details can be found here: EuroHockey U18

The Boys just missed out on a medal and finished 4th. The Boys competed against, Italy, Switzerland, Lithuania and the Czech Republic. Full details can be found here: EuroHockey U18 Championship II-B 2023 Boys - EuroHockey

Following the Europeans our U18s also competed at the first England Hockey Talent Academy Festival. This provided them with a series of matches over the bank holiday weekend at Nottingham.

Finally, whilst the transition of programme began, the 2022/2023 season culminated in another 11-day Erasmus trip to Holland, this occurred during the October half term. 18 Boys got to experience the culture and hockey in Holland as well as train and spend time together both on and off the pitch.

This is an invaluable amount of time and not something we are often able to offer for our junior athletes, however, thanks to funding support from the Erasmus+ project it allowed the players to play hockey in some of the best Dutch clubs and even get to meet international hockey players and watch some

The team presented Ton with a signed Wales shirt to show their gratitude and thanks.

Thank you to all programme staff who help drive and steer these programmes. With a number of staff moving on we would like to express our thanks to them and wish them good luck in their future endeavours.



2023/2024 NAGS U18

Inline with our new pathway, this allowed us to adapt and start our NAGS programme earlier. This saw a period of transition as we reviewed our NAGS staffing and appointed some new staff. Due to it being the first year and in order for eligible players to be seen, all previous RPC players were invited for assessment, after a period of assessment, 36 U18 Boys and 36 U18 Girls were selected as part of the NAGS 2023/24 programme. Newly for this season we also selected a number of NAG reserves.

Starting in 2023, we introduced NAGS Regional Training, this allowed coaches to have more regular contact time to develop players technically whilst minimising the time and travel for players, these were also the sessions which our NAG reserves could access. The regional sessions run in either North Wales or South Wales, approximately once a month. We also run whole squad activity during the school holidays. This allows more tactical and squad development. The February half term saw the first Antidoping introduction to start the conversation and educate our young athletes. During the half term both the Boys and Girls groups received a wellbeing workshop delivered by Lloyd Ashley, an ex-professional rugby player. He covered the topic of resilience and emphasised the importance of mental health and looking after/ checking in on each other.

Following this the groups had some more regional training before coming together again for an exciting Easter series. This was one of the first times that 4 of our performance programmes all played at home and against differing opposition. This created an excellent event which also launched our new match kit following our kit partnership with Kitlocker and Castore.

Our NAG U18 Girls played a tightly contested 3 matches series against Canada U18, this finished in a series draw after a drawn first game, narrow loss in the second and finally a narrow win in game 3.

WALES MASTERS MEN: 1 APRIL 2023 - 31 MARCH 2024

The year was one of mixed fortunes for the Men's Masters teams with results broadly disappointing - oh for some more proven goal scorers was a theme across many age groups – but much promise for the future. The outstanding performance of the year was the O55s Silver Medal at the inaugural World Indoor Championships (see below) backed up by some great results across the other age groups. We look forward to further success in this format and a cross-over to the outdoor squads as well and many thanks go to Rob Blacklidge for masterminding this new venture. The standout performance at the outdoor Europeans also came from the O55s who missed out on a possible Bronze to a single 4th quarter English goal.

Further demonstrating the growth and ambition of our squads have been the 3 international events held in Cardiff as set out below – international experience is vital and playing in Cardiff

before significant crowds demonstrates the health of Masters hockey. This is exemplified by the O75s who played in their first European Championships and hosted what we think was the first O75 4 Nations tournament in the UK. World Masters Indoor, Nottingham – March 2024

The first ever World Masters Indoor Cup was held in Nottingham over Easter for both Men and Women. This was an extraordinarily popular tournament much enjoyed by the players and spectators alike. For the Welsh men, it was a superb debut on the World stage.

Pride of place goes to the O55s who came away with the silver medal – only their fourth of any colour won by Wales Men at any World Cup. The O55s came second in their group following a 4-9 defeat to Germany and 2-0 and 8-4 victories over Belgium and Spain respectively. This was just a prelude! Having fallen 3-0 down to England midway through the second quarter in the semi-final, Wales fought

back a 4-3 win over the Pool A winners. A second miracle almost happened again in the final against the Netherlands. After an even more potentially confidence destroying start with the Netherlands 3-0 up after 4 minutes, Wales then showed remarkable spirit to fight back to 3-3 with their own burst of 3 goals in 6 minutes, but the Dutch edged ahead again meaning the score was 4-3 at the end of the second quarter. And, most unusually for an indoor match, that is how it remained with no goals in the final 20 minutes. However, disappointing as it might have been placed in the context of other results – the Netherlands had beaten Germany 7-4 in the other semi-final and Germany then beat England 11-4 in the 3/4th place play-off, this was a truly great performance by the Welsh O55s.

Two other age groups also produced great performances to reach their semi-finals. The O60s drew 5-5 with Switzerland, beat the USA 5-4 and lost to the Netherlands 0-3. Germany proved too strong in the semi-final winning 5-1, as did England in the 3/4th place play-off, winning 6-1. A special mention should be made of Andy Rhys-Jones who scored 11 of Wales' 12 goals.



The O35s made an amazing recovery after losing their first game to Germany 1-21 to beat the USA 9-8 and Ghana 8-1 but losing 5-6 to Scotland. They then lost 4-8 to Scotland in their semi-final and drew 3-3 with the USA in the 3/4th place match before losing 0-2 in the shoot-out. Again, special mention of Ben Croxall (11) and Tim Jones (9) who scored two thirds of Wales goals between them.

Two close pool results not quite going Wales' way – 6-6 v Canada and 5-6 v Guyana, preceded by a 2-12 loss to England, saw the O45s go into the 5-8th place play-offs. Here they found the winning touch

to defeat Bangladesh 5-4 and Austria 7-5 to take 5th place with Dan Makaruk scoring 9 goals.

The O50s got off to a good start with a 7-2 win over the USA, but then 3-8 to the Netherlands and 3-7 to England. The first game in the 5-8th place play-offs saw a 4-7 defeat to Italy but Wales came back to beat the USA again 4-3 to take 7th place with captain Joergen Jaehnig scoring 9 goals.

So a great tournament overall for Wales with the bonus of a silver medal, new players joining who had not played outdoor for us, and the opportunity to play countries we had never met before such as Bangladesh, Guyana and Ghana. The possibility of a European Cup in 2025 is something everyone involved in Nottingham will look forward to.

Whatever the results, the enduring message from the 2023/24 season was that we have a clear post-covid benchmark of where we currently stand and are working hard to put in place plans for future development, and continue to play in tournaments whether international or friendly and enjoying both the great competitiveness and camaraderie of Masters hockey.



WALES WOMENS MASTERS REPORT 2023 – 2024 SEASON

Trials for the 2023 season started in Nov/Dec 2022 attendance at trials is getting larger year on year with some age groups nearly at the point of putting a second team into the spirit of the masters' tournaments which are run alongside all major competitions, the pool of players appears to be getting bigger year on year, due to players playing later in life to be able to play in Masters hockey and we are also seeing players coming back into the game across all age groups, but remarkably in the 65s bracket which allowed us to form our first 65s team for this season.

We continue to be supported by a large array of Coaches, Managers, Medics, Umpires and technical officials who put a lot of self-funded time and effort into ensuring the success and progress of our Womens masters teams, with some travelling considerable distances to attend trails and training in Wales, the level of experience, skill and professionalism amongst this support group is top notch and Womens Masters Hockey would be nowhere without them.

The 2023 season saw the start of the women's age groups being split into separate dates and venues for all competitions, and such is the success of Masters hockey in Wales invites for new tournaments are flooding in such as our 35's to 45's being invited to play in a tournament run by Gibraltar Hockey and our older age groups invited to play in

a four nations tournament in Germany, We are also being invited to play in a lot of different tournaments across the UK as masters hockey at all levels of the game continues to grow with International teams invited into domestic tournaments to raise the profile of the tournament.

The GB&I (Home nations) tournament for the 35s – 45s age groups were held in Swansea, and we were well supported by Hockey Wales to organise and run the tournament which proved to be a great success, across the age groups there were some good wins and very close games.



The older age groups 50's – 65s travelled to Glasgow for their tournament where again there were plenty of wins some losses and very close games the weather in Glasgow was unseasonably hot which made playing conditions quite hard especially during the midday games, however the tournament was well organised and extra water breaks were factored into the games.

The European tournament for the 35s – 50s was held in Nottingham unfortunately the entries from other countries for the 40s group was very poor which led to us making the decision to withdraw that age group from the tournament due to lake of competition, the other age groups had a good tournament again with a mix of results with the 35s narrowly missing out on the medals.

he 55s - 65s travelled to Valencia for their European tournament which was held during a European wide heat wave making playing conditions very challenging all teams worked hard during the tournament with managers and medics managing the heat effects on players very well, the 55s finished 5th in their group with the 60s narrowly missed out on a Bronze medal, the 65s however in their first year together walked away with the Bronze medal beating Holland in a hard fought game.




